What is it about?

We will explore how we could improve access to breast cancer care pathways for South Asian people living with and beyond breast cancer and their families/carers.

We want to invite you as 'experts by experience' and create a safe space to share experiences and make decisions together.

- We will explore the **challenges** of breast cancer care pathways.
- Create and design solutions together, led by you and fellow participants.

Why am I invited?

You are invited because you are either:

- A person (aged 18 to 65) who is South Asian living with or beyond breast cancer
- Family members and carers (aged 18 to 65) of South Asian person, caring for someone living with or beyond breast cancer
- Community leader / Health and social care practitioner

And also:

- Have experience of using NHS cancer care support and/or other support (e.g. community, personal); and
- Live in London (United Kingdom)

What will I be doing?



INTERVIEW (1 HOUR) - OCT TO NOV 2021

An individual interview session where we will talk about your own, or the person you care for, experiences of cancer diagnosis and any positives and negatives of your experiences.



DESIGN WORKSHOP (2 HOURS) - JAN TO FEB 2022

This session is to **generate design questions and ideas** for possible solutions alone with the researcher.



GROUP WORKSHOP (3 HOURS) - FEB TO MARCH 2022

This session is to generate design questions and ideas for possible solutions as a group, with other participants.



FEEDBACK SESSIONS (1-2 HOURS) - MARH TO APRIL 2022

This session is to **provide feedback and make decisions** together on the best solution.



All meetings will be online, using Zoom.




You can indicate if you prefer an inperson meeting. We will abide by the most updated COVID guidance for any optional in-person meetings.

Common Questions



Can I withdraw from the study?

Yes. It is up to you to decide whether or not to take part.

We understand that circumstances change, and even if you decide to take part in the project, you are free and welcome to change your mind and withdraw from the project without giving a reason.

Withdrawing from the project, at any stage, will not affect the current care you receive or your relationship with the researcher.

All the data will be deleted, except the results that have already been analysed or published.



What support will I receive?

If anyone is concerned about the impact of receiving a monetary reward for their involvement on benefits, you can get in touch with us, and we will signpost you to confidential and free advice.

If the project raises any difficult emotions, participants can request to be put in touch with a Mental Health First Aider from Imperial College for support. We can also key contact/support from the cancer information specialists.

You will receive continuous support from the researcher, Ms Soh- Yon Park, for further information and resources.



What will happen to the result of this research?

The interview data collected will be anonymised to remove all identifiable information, including your name.

The ideas, drawings, notes from the sessions, will be used to develop prototypes of design solutions for this project. Any data will be fully anonymised.

You will not be personally named alongside any quotes from the session; however, if you wish to be personally listed under the acknowledgements section of the researcher's publications, you can indicate this on the consent form.

The results of this project will be included in future publications (articles/blogs) and peer-reviewed literature academic papers for the researcher's fellowship.

What if something goes wrong?

The study has been carefully designed to minimise any risk to you. You may decide to share some personal information when answering some of the questions. You may also feel uncomfortable answering questions about some of the topics.

You do not have to answer any questions if you don't wish to do so. However, we do not want this to happen; you do not have to give us any reason for not responding to any question.

If you are harmed by taking part in this research project, there are no special compensation arrangements. If you are harmed due to someone's negligence, you may have grounds for legal action.

If you wish to complain or have any concerns about any aspect of the way you have been treated during the course of this study then you should immediately inform the researcher.

How will we use this information about you? Research Study Title: Equity to Cancer Care 21IC7139

Imperial College London is the sponsor for this study and will act as the data controller for this study. This means that we are responsible for looking after your information and using it properly. Imperial College London will keep your personal data for:

- 10 years after the study has finished in relation to data subject consent forms.
- 10 years after the study has completed in relation to primary research data.

We will need to use information from you for this research project. People will use this information to do the research or to check your records to make sure that the research is being done properly. We will keep all information about you safe and secure.

Once we have finished the study, we will keep some of the data so we can check the results. We will write our reports in a way that no-one can work out that you took part in the study.



Legal Basis

As a university, we use personally-identifiable information to conduct research to improve health, care and services. As a publicly-funded organisation, we have to ensure that it is in the public interest when we use personally-identifiable information from people who have agreed to take part in research. This means that when you agree to take part in a research study, we will use your data in the ways needed to conduct and analyse the research study. Health and care research should serve the public interest, which means that we have to demonstrate that our research serves the interests of society as a whole. We do this by following the UK Policy Framework for Health and Social Care Research

International Transfers

There may be a requirement to transfer information to countries outside the European Economic Area (for example, to a research partner). Where this information contains your personal data, Imperial College London will ensure that it is transferred in accordance with data protection legislation.
